



Rosina “Rose” Taulbut

(1868-1964)

Rosina “Rose” Taulbut and her well-known husband, Tony, settled in Mission with their two children in 1909.

A pioneering woman, Mrs. Taulbut withstood the hardships of winter and crude living conditions. She found “It was a lonely life for women but even so they had fun.”

In 1920, the family moved from Stave Lake Street to Second Avenue – on the northeast corner of James and Second.

In their new home, a special room was built for the invaluable collection of relics and historic records acquired by her husband. Mrs. Taulbut, “who always took an active interest in her husband’s hobby” kept the collection intact and “always welcomed visitors” who came to see their “museum”.

Described as a “tiny, gentle-voiced” person who was a “home-body”, Mrs. Taulbut contributed to the community’s development in her own quiet way.
